The survey

- Hypothesis: how libraries are selecting and acquiring books for their general collection is changing rapidly
- How to explore this? A survey!
- Topics: current use of book vendors, ebook packages, DDA, EBA, OA; staffing, preferred formats, assessment, etc. - and predictions for future trends
- 44 medium and large Canadian academic libraries collecting primarily in English invited to respond; 32 valid responses

Survey question structure

For each acquisition method ...

- Does your library currently use this method?
- Probing questions about that acq method: staffing, assessment, etc.
- Prediction: in the next 5-10 years, do you anticipate your library's use of [method] will increase / stay the same / decrease?

Use of *[method]* in 5-10 years:

Library use of book vendors

- 84% receive slips/forms
- 53% receive approvals/auto-ship
- 85% selection done by subject librarians

Sample quote: "Until two years ago all of our [vendor] approval plans were operational with the e-preferred format. Since then, they are all set to virtual: i.e. slips are sent instead of books." Use of book vendors in 5-10 years: **↑ 7%** \rightarrow 33% **↓ 60%**

Book format preference

- 65% e-preferred
- 6% "e-encouraged"

29% no policy

Format selection factors:

- Cost (11)
- License model, DRM (8)
- User request (8)
- Discipline (6)
- Nature of content (3)
- Intended uses (3)

Library use of ebook frontlist packages

84% order ebook packages

"Every 3-4 years, ebook packages receive a full review to consider COUNTER usage of the package. Librarians measure 1) Percentage of materials in the package that have never been used, 3 and 4 years post acquisition; 2) Cost per title in the package compared with individual title acquisition"

Use of packages in **5-10 years**: ↑ **59%** $\rightarrow 26\%$ **↓ 15%**

Library use of DDA and EBA

59% use DDA plan(s)Use of DDA72% use EBA plan(s)in 5-10years:

- ↑ **32%**
- \rightarrow **42%**
 - ↓ **26%**

2 will start

Use of EBA in 5-10 years: **↑ 74%** \rightarrow 9% **↓ 17%** 2 will start

EBA title selection considerations

- Usage (20)
- Libn input (9)
- Cost threshold (8)
- Disciplinary diff (6)
- Faculty rec (4)
- Duplication (3)
- Local author, weeding opp, pub year ...

"... download counts cannot be the only criteria considered. Depending on the subject coverage of the EBA, each relevant subject cluster ... is generally allocated a % of the total purchase commitment amount for their selections."

Assessment

- Book vendors: mostly tweaking of approval profiles
- Ebook packages: "We purchase it and then we're done thinking about it."
- DDA: "We look at usage and then work with the subject librarians to refine the pool. We also remove old titles (older than 3 years) on a regular basis." vs. "No real assessment as we don't buy unless it's used."
- Hard to generalize, but: not much focus on assessment

Managing OA ebooks: complaints

- Which collection to activate: low qual, non-English titles, regional copyright
- Poor metadata, broken links, slow to update
- Double-dipping

- "Hathi Trust overwhelmed our own catalogue results and had to be turned off."
- Platform neutrality
- (local records) Too much work, link rot

"How will book selection and acquisition in academic libraries look different ten years from now?"

#1 Theme: more e, less print (20)

• But: concern for niches, ILL, guest users

#2 Theme: reduced collections role for subject librarians (12)

• "the role of the subject librarian in selecting material will be minimal, again focused more on unique/specialized materials"

Themes - part 2

#3 Theme: more DDA / EBA (10)

#4 Theme: more OA (10)

• "OA is a fad", "bit of a mess frankly"

#5 Theme: role of book vendors - split

- more direct purchasing from publishers (3)
- Less use of approval plans (2) vs. more (4) "boosted by Al"

Themes - part 3

- 3-5 mentions
 - OERs replace textbooks
 - More frontlist packages
- Less book purchasing in general (budgets, OA)

2 mentions

- Collaborative / consortial purchasing
- More purchase-to-open
- Diversity problem: small pubs not available e
- Accessibility concerns

Provocative summary

- Role of book vendors \downarrow
- Packages ↑, DDA →, EBA ↑
- Assessment: we're not doing enough
- OA: desired but problematic

- Role of subject librarians \downarrow
- EBA title selection: a work in progress
- E-preferred ↑
